This document outlines how a sustainable investment in PowerSchool’s College, Career, and Life Readiness tool, PowerSchool Naviance CCLR, can be achieved using long-standing federal funds, COVID emergency relief funds, and unique state grants.

Funding Source	Alignment to PowerSchool Naviance CCLR
ESSER	<p>ESSER funds are used to meet district needs arising from the COVID-19 pandemic, including accelerating learning, adopting systems to ensure continuity of services, and all allowable uses of ESEA Title and Carl D. Perkins Act funds.</p> <p>PowerSchool Naviance CCLR addresses impacts of the pandemic by ensuring that all students and families have uninterrupted access to college and career planning to guide their academic growth, support on-time graduation, and promote post-secondary success.</p>
Title I Part A	<p>The core purposes of Title I Part A are to ensure that all students meet challenging state academic standards and to close achievement gaps.</p> <p>By providing every student with differentiated and flexible pathways to secondary and post-secondary success, with the potential to accelerate learning, close achievement gaps, and increase graduation rates, an investment in Naviance using Title I funds may be allowable. The PowerSchool Naviance CCLR solution enables parents and families to view progress towards individualized goals and to provide guidance and support.</p>
Title IV Part A	<p>An investment in PowerSchool Naviance CCLR aligns readily to intents of Title IV Part A funds. Activities to promote college and career readiness are called out specifically in statute as allowable, and features that support personal strengths, goal-setting, and the social and emotional well-being of students meet Title IV’s Safe and Healthy Students intent.</p>
Title V Part B	<p>Title V funds, or "REAP" funds, are made available to rural districts to supplement other federal grants. These funds may be used towards any of the allowable uses of other Title funds, including promoting achievement, whole-student well-being, and college and career readiness.</p>

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Carl D. Perkins	<p>Perkins funds are used to develop more fully the academic and career and technical skills of secondary education students who enroll in technical education programs.</p> <p>The PowerSchool Naviance CCLR platform maps career pathways, promotes work-based experiences, and strengthens academic, career, and technical skills of students in preparation for post-secondary opportunities.</p>
Unique State and Federal Grants	<p>Many states make competitive grants available to school districts to aid in addressing high-priority needs including academic achievement, graduation rates, and college and career readiness. These popular grants can be leveraged towards an investment in PowerSchool's Naviance CCLR solution.</p> <p>Competitive federal funds such as GEAR UP, Trio, and Promise Neighborhood programs have specific allowable uses to build college and career readiness.</p>
General Fund	<p>Districts may choose to leverage their general fund towards digital systems that improve student outcomes, reduce demands on staff, and yield cost savings. A highly automated and accessible tool for college, career, and life readiness can have significant impacts on student achievement, staff workloads, and the effective use of district resources.</p>
